Note from the Editor

It gives me immense pleasure to present herewith, the Winter 2014 edition of the *CLAWS Journal*. This issue puts together a bunch of articles on a diverse range of security related subjects and deliberates upon the policy options available. In addition to discussing the above-mentioned subjects, this edition also puts forth the significance and need for reliable, swift and secure hotline communication between governments. However, India has had a mixed experience on the success of hotlines – even though they provide "a window" for initiating dialogue – the start point in the resolution, at any stage, of a conflict. Finally, the *Journal*, carries an article on the Army's requirement of Business Process Reengineering. While the Army is not a business, in order to be victoriously thriving, it must exhibit "world-class" business practices. The *Journal* highlights the emerging reality that the significance of management has increased manifold given the quantum and costs of resources available at the disposal of commanders in the field.

The Editorial Team hopes that this issue of the *CLAWS Journal* will contribute towards the overall thinking regarding the issues elaborated above by furthering enrichment and focus of the discourse. As always, I look forward to your feedback and comments.
